Introduction

The Planning Framework is the collation of planning data for each specific LGA in a defined area and their Local Planning Area and is a working document.

The Planning Framework is developed through a collaborative process with the Department of Ageing Disability and Home Care, the Local Council Aged and Disability Workers and the community care sector.

The intent of this document is to:

- describe the currently available information and data on the area, including demographics, service system, specialist services within the generic system, DADHC funding and the roles played by various organisations within the framework; and
- track issues affecting the area, with a view to identifying service gaps and possible innovative service projects that may benefit the area.

An analysis of the information contained in the document may result in various responses, outcomes and expectations including:

- increase in funding;
- amalgamation of services;
- coordination of service types;
- review of service models; and
- additional mapping and more in depth information.

The document will be reviewed, on a regular basis with the Local Council Aged and Disability Worker and the community care sector, both through formal meetings and through informal processes.

Similar Frameworks are available for:

- Northern Sydney Local Planning Area; and
- Nepean Local Planning Area.

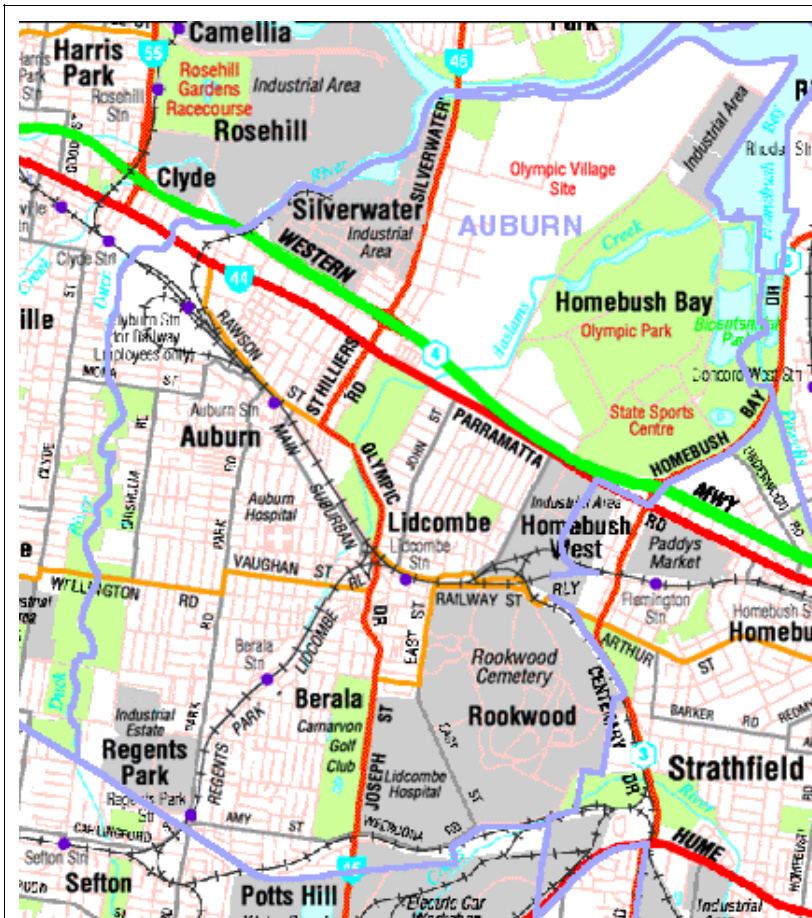

1. Area Profile

1.1 Geography

Metro North Region consists of 3 Local Planning Areas, Cumberland Prospect, Nepean and Northern Sydney Local Planning Areas. The Cumberland Prospect Local Planning Area covers Auburn, Holroyd, Parramatta, Blacktown and Baulkham Hills Local Government Areas (LGAs). The geographic areas covered in this framework are the Auburn, Holroyd and Parramatta LGAs.

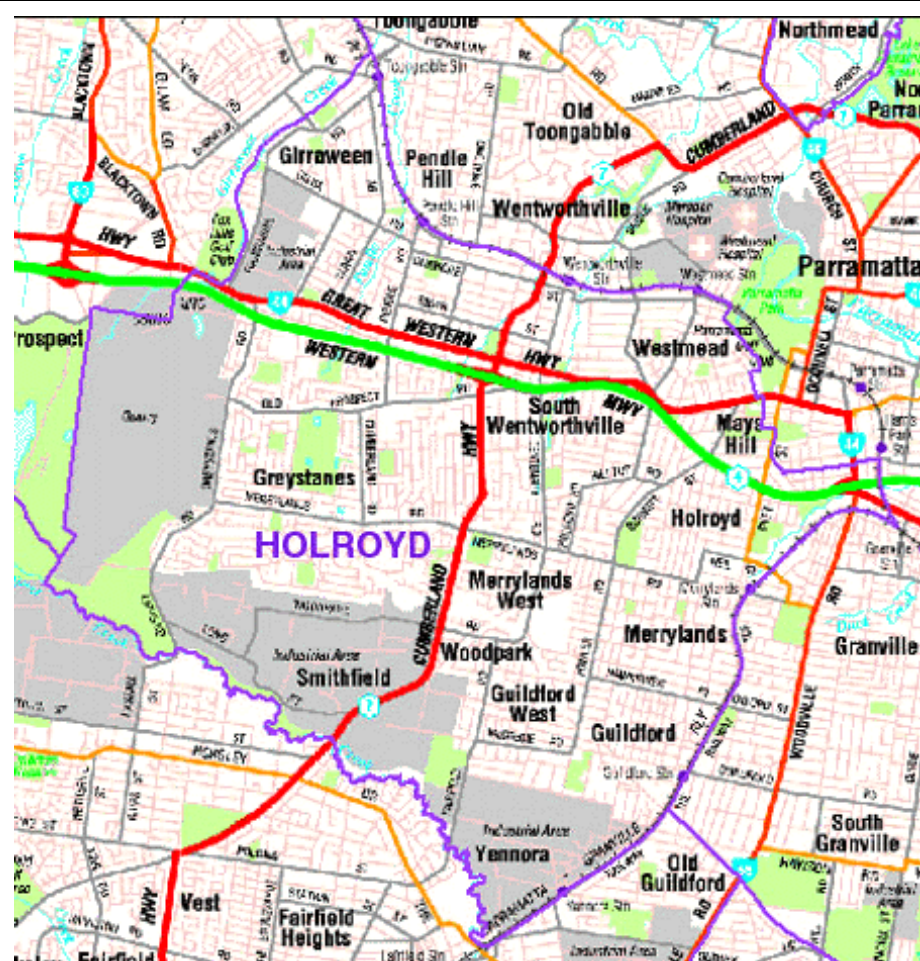

Auburn is situated 20 km west of Sydney CBD and covers 31 square kilometres. Auburn's boundaries include Parramatta Road and Duck River in the north and west, Homebush Bay and Powell's Creek to the east and the Sydney Water Supply Line to the south. Auburn was first developed as a residential area during the interwar period, but today the residential suburbs are interlaced with industrial areas.

About 60% of the area is made up of residential, industrial and commercial development. The remaining 40% includes open space, Sydney Olympic Park, and Rookwood Cemetery. There are five town centres: Auburn, Lidcombe, Berala, Regents Park and Newington on the western edge of Olympic Park.

The Holroyd LGA is situated approximately 25 kilometres west of the Sydney Central Business District. It covers an area of 39.89 square kilometres. Holroyd is bounded by the cities of Parramatta (north-east), Fairfield (south) and Blacktown (west). The Great Western Highway and the M4 bisect Holroyd east-west and provide access to Parramatta and Sydney from the outer western suburbs. Around 60% of the LGA is zoned for Residential use and another 30% is Industrial zoning.

Parramatta is located 24kms from central Sydney and just 6kms from Sydney Olympic Park. The city is a historic neighbourhood of Sydney. Parramatta was the site of the second settlement of Australia and is a transport hub accessible by road, rail and ferry. Parramatta's original Aboriginal inhabitants are the Burramattagal people.

Parramatta LGA covers 61 sq. km. with around 720 hectares classified as open space. It is the sixth largest CBD in Australia, and ranks as one of the State's four 'Primary Centres'. Parramatta has the twelfth largest population of any city in NSW and is designated as Sydney's second CBD in the Metropolitan Strategy for Sydney. Parramatta's \$8.9 billion per annum economy (at factor cost) was Australia's fifth largest in 2004/05. It has Sydney's largest health facility, the multi-hospital campus at Westmead.

1.2 Population

Population summary for Auburn, Holroyd and Parramatta LGAs follows:

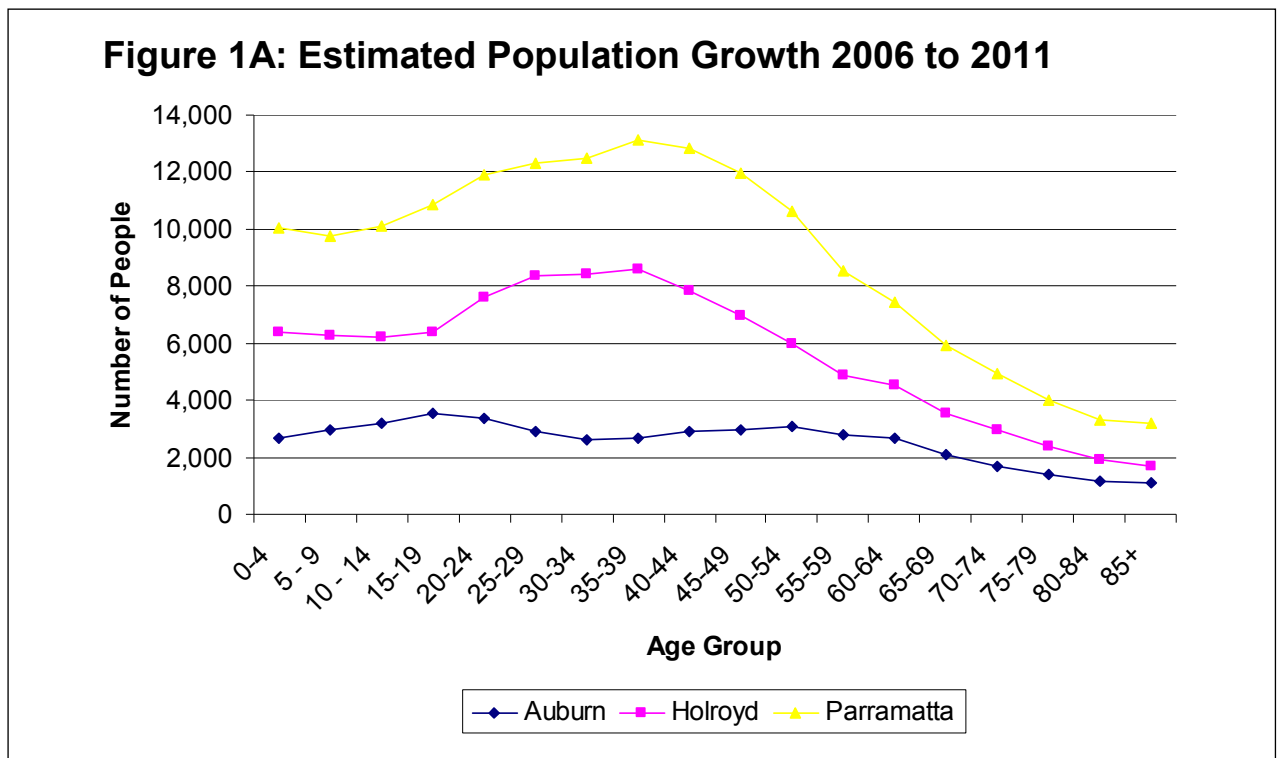
1.2.1 General Population

The population of Australia in August, 2006 was 19,855,288 and 6,549,177 (33%) of these lived in NSW. The population growth in the last 5 years was 5.8% nationally and 3.5% for NSW (Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) 2006 Census).

The population of Auburn was 64,957 according to the ABS 2006 Census. NSW Government has projected the population to be 77,780 in 2011 and 94,150 in 2031.

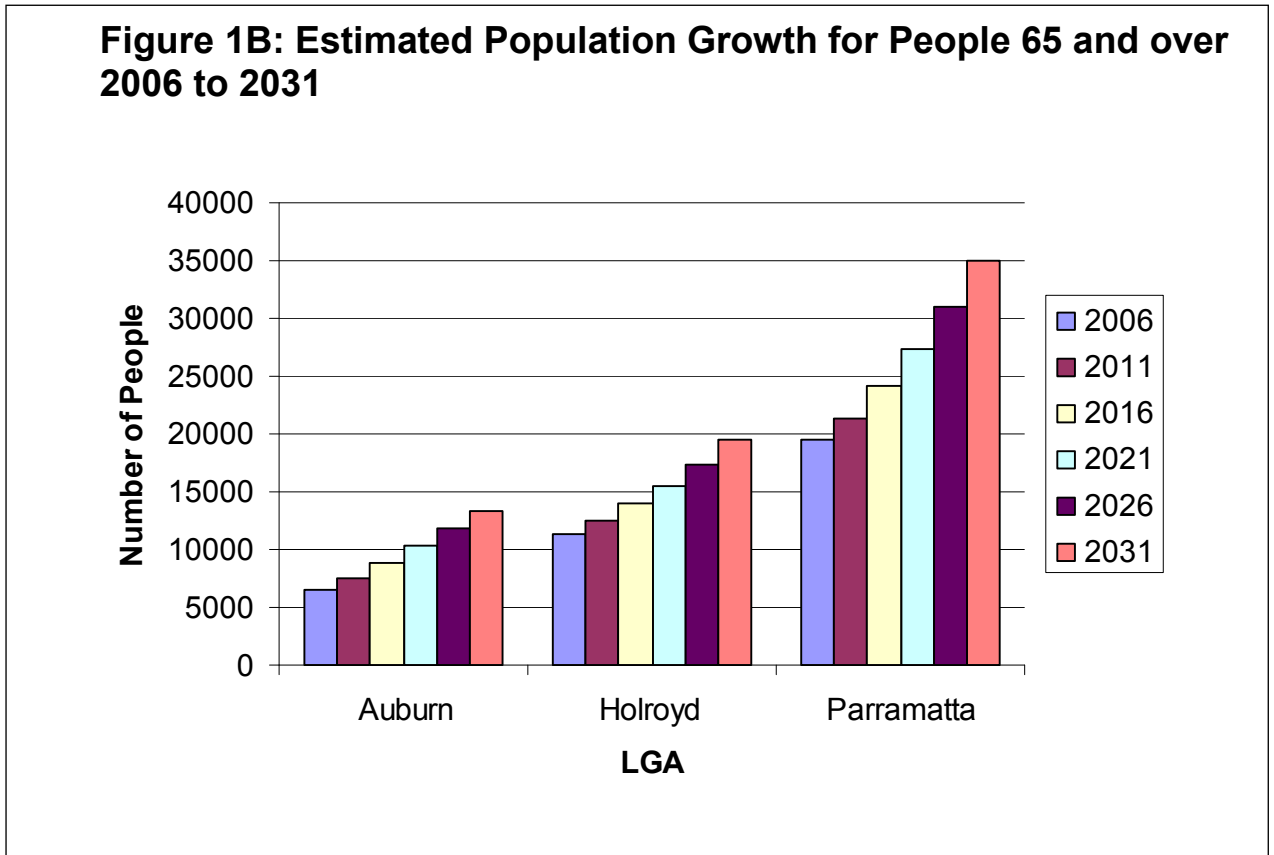
The Population of Holroyd was 89,766 according to the ABS 2006 Census. NSW Government has projected the population to be 100,910 in 2011 and 122,890 in 2031.

The Population of Parramatta was 148,324 according to the ABS 2006 Census. NSW Government has projected the population to be 154,620 and 196,780 in 2031. (See Tables A1, A2 & A3 in appendix.)

1.2.2 Population Density

Population density in this area is highest for the LGA of Parramatta, with a population density of 2,431.5 persons per square kilometre, with Holroyd 2,227.4 and Auburn 2,004.8. (See Table 1 below.)

1.2.3 Age Distribution

There is an increasing ageing population with 18.7% of the total population in NSW aged 60 years and over, compared to 17.3% in 2001. This is also higher than the national average of 18.1% (ABS Census data).

Both nationally and in NSW the median age was 37 years in 2006, up from 35 years in 2001. The median age of the population in Auburn, Holroyd and Parramatta is 31.0, 34.0 and 34.0 years respectively. (Table A5 in appendix.)

According to the ABS 2006 Census data, in the Holroyd LGA the highest growth age group in the last 10 years is 85 years and over (70.4% increase), followed by 80-84 years with 50.2% increase. In Parramatta the highest growth age group is 85 years and over (56.3% increase) followed by 80-84 years with 29.8% increase. In Auburn the highest growth age group is also 85 years and over with (45.7% increase) followed by 15-24 years with 42% increase.

According to the ABS 2006 Census data, the proportion of age groups for Auburn, Holroyd and Parramatta is:

Auburn

- 21.0% under 15 years;
- 70.0% in the 15 – 64 year age group;
- 8.9% in the 65 years and over.

Holroyd

- 20.6% under 15 years;
- 67.2% in the 15 – 64 year age group;
- 12.2% in the 65 years and over.

Parramatta

- 19.1% under 15 years;
- 68.6% in the 15 – 64 year age group;
- 12.3% in the 65 years and over.

1.2.4 Home and Community Care (HACC) Target Group

The estimated increase in the HACC target population from 2007/08 to 2010/11 for NSW is 29,140, rising from 568,116 to 597,256, and for the Auburn, Holroyd, Parramatta area the estimated increase is 2,648, rising from 58,188 to 60,836 people.

The estimated increase in the HACC target group for the individual LGAs, is from:

- 4,723 to 4,945 in Auburn LGA;
- 7,378 to 7,746 in Holroyd LGA; and
- 12,193 to 12,727 in Parramatta LGA.

The proportion of people within a LGA receiving HACC services is positively related to the level of financial disadvantage. In other words, as the financial disadvantage of a LGA increases so too does the proportion of the LGA receiving HACC services. The Index of Economic Resources (IER) reflects the profile of the economic resources of families within areas. Higher scores indicate that the area has a higher proportion of families on high income, a lower proportion of low income families, and more households living in large houses.

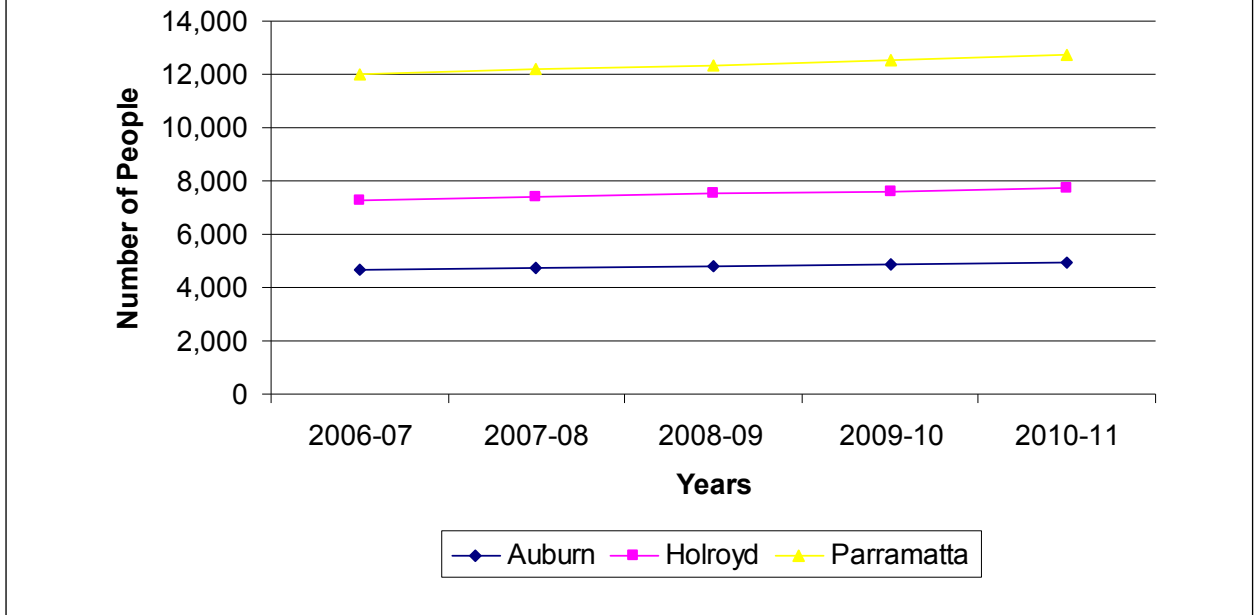
The IER for:

- NSW is 1031;
- Cumberland Prospect Local Planning Area is 1055; and
- The range for Auburn, Holroyd and Parramatta is 968 to 1040.

(ABS Index of Economic Resources, 2001).

As these IERs are at the mid to high end of the scale the mean percentage of LGA populations receiving HACC services for the 3 LGAs is in the high percentage range of 2.80% to 4.60% for the 2005/06 period (HACC MDS data 2005/06).

1.2.5 People with Disabilities

The estimated total population of people with a disability in the 3 LGAs is 101,699 with 22.8% residing in Parramatta LGA, 14.3% in Holroyd and 9.2% in the Auburn LGA. This percentage holds across all severity types. (ABS synthetic estimates from the survey data 2003), (see Table A7 in appendix).

Auburn:

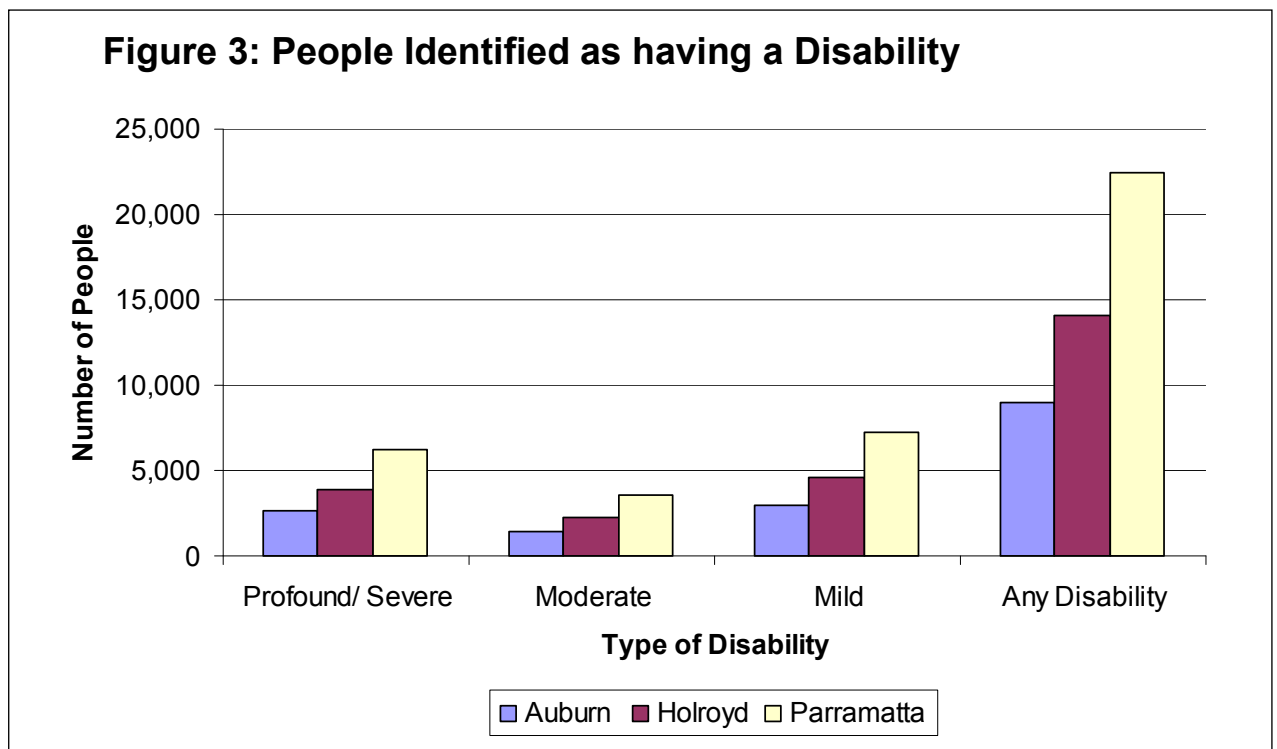
- 2,603 people with a profound to severe disability;
- 1,440 people with a moderate disability;
- 2,942 people with a mild disability; and
- 9,006 with any disability.

Holroyd:

- 3,835 people with a profound to severe disability;
- 2,238 people with a moderate disability;
- 4,590 people with a mild disability; and
- 14,049 people with any disability.

Parramatta:

- 6,253 people with a profound to severe disability;
- 3,585 people with a moderate disability;
- 7,260 people with a mild disability; and
- 22,420 people with any disability.

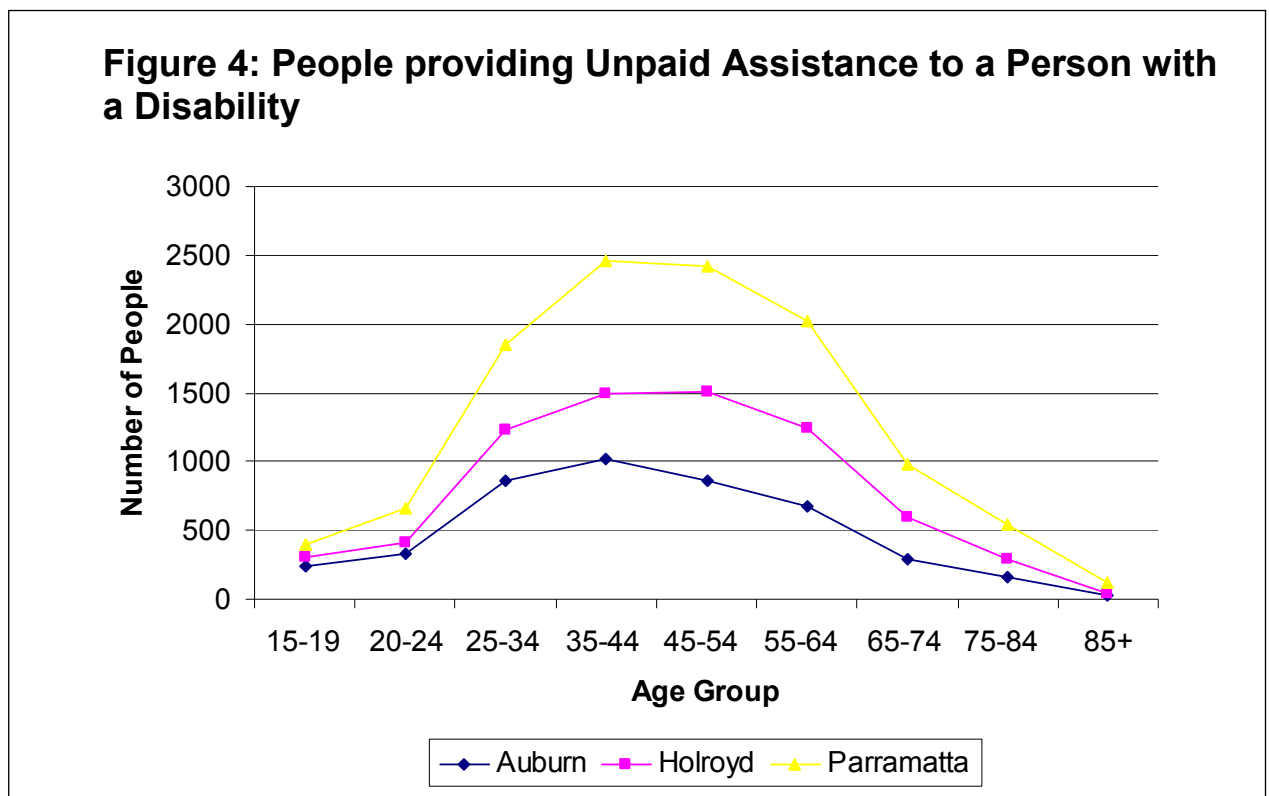

1.2.6 Unpaid Carers

Of all persons aged 15 years and over in NSW, 10.4% provided unpaid assistance to those who needed help because of a disability, a long term illness or problems related to old age (in the two weeks before the Census night). This includes people who were in receipt of the Carer Allowance or Carer Payment (ABS 2006 Census data).

Locally the number of unpaid carers according to the ABS 2006 Census data were 4,459 in Auburn LGA; 7,104 in the Holroyd LGA; and 11,452 in the Parramatta LGA, representing 8.7%; 10.0%; and 9.5% of the 15 years and over population respectively. The 55-64 years age group had the highest percentage of age group population as unpaid carers with 13.1% in Auburn LGA; 13.7% in Holroyd LGA and 14.9% in Parramatta LGA. (See Table A8 in appendix.)

In NSW Indigenous people were more likely to provide care than the general population, 12.4% of Indigenous providing care, compared to 10.4% for the general population. Similar to the general population, the majority of Indigenous carers were female and people aged 25-54 dominated the carer group (ABS 2006 Census data).

1.2.7 Type of Household

Nearly half the households in the general population live in couples households followed by households with: a non-dependent child; and dependent student 15-24 years for the three LGAs. There were between 4.3% and 5.1% of lone parent households, see Table 2A below.

Couple households account for more than 50 percent of the household type in the age group 65 years and over in Auburn, Holroyd and Parramatta LGAs. This is followed by the Lone Parent households which account for almost 30 percent of households for the over 65 year age group in all three LGAs. (See Table 2B below and Table A9 in appendix.)

1.2.8 Income Support

The number of people receiving Selected Income Support for the 3 LGAs as at June 2003 appears in Table 3 below. It can be seen that the majority of people receiving an Age pension, Disability Support pension or other pensions and allowances are living in the Parramatta LGA. 1.2.9 Culturally and Linguistically Diverse (CALD) Populations

In Auburn LGA 63.4% of people were born overseas, in Parramatta 48.3% and in Holroyd 47.0%.

In the Auburn LGA, the highest percentage of the general population born overseas came from the following countries:

- 9.3% China;
- 5.0% Vietnam;
- 4.0% Turkey;
- 3.5% Lebanon;
- 2.7% Republic of South Korea.

In the Holroyd LGA, the highest percentage of the general population born overseas came from the following countries:

- 4.7% Lebanon;
- 3.8% India;
- 2.6% China;
- 2.1% New Zealand ;
- 2.0% United Kingdom;
- 2.0% Sri Lanka.

In the Parramatta LGA, the highest percentage of the general population born overseas came from the following countries:

- 5.6% China;
- 4.8% India;
- 4.2% Lebanon;
- 2.8% United Kingdom;
- 1.8% New Zealand;
- 1.8% Philippines.

According to the ABS 2006 Census data the populations of Auburn, Holroyd, and Parramatta who described their proficiency in English as “Not Well” or “Not at All” were significant.

In Auburn:

- 22.1% speak English Only;
- 47.6% or 30,901 speak Other Language and speaks English Very Well or Well;
- 18.1% or 11,788 speak Other Language and speaks English Not Well or Not at All;
- 12.2% Language and proficiency in English Not Stated.

In Holroyd:

- 48.6% speaks English Only;
- 37.3% or 33,492 speak Other Language and speaks English Very Well or Well;
- 7.7% or 6,885 speak Other Language and speaks English Not Well or Not at All;
- 6.4% Language and proficiency in English Not Stated.

In Parramatta:

- 48.8% speak English Only;
- 35.5% or 52,727 speak Other Language and speaks English Very Well or Well;
- 8.3% or 12,356 speak Other Language and speaks English Not Well or Not at All;
- 7.4% Language and proficiency in English Not Stated.

For the 65 and over age group, the percentage that Speaks Other Language and speaks English Not Well or Not at All increases to:

- Auburn – 32.0% (1,868) of the 65 years and over age group;
- Holroyd – 15.4% (1,679) for the 65 years and over age group;
- Parramatta – 14.6% (2,669) for the 65 years and over age group.

1.2.10 Aboriginal Population

The Aboriginal population for the 3 LGAs is 1,372 which is 0.92% of the population. The highest number of Aboriginal people are living in Parramatta (1,202), followed by Holroyd (738) and lastly Auburn (442). The highest Aboriginal age group for Holroyd and Parramatta LGAs is the 10 to 14 years age group, with the highest age group for Auburn being the 30-34 years age group, (11.1% Holroyd, 9.98% Parramatta and 18.1% Auburn, of the Aboriginal population). This is followed by the 5-9 years age group in Parramatta (9.97%) the 5-9 years age group and the 15-19 years age group in Holroyd (10.1% and 10.0% respectively) and the 25 to 29 years age group in Auburn (14.57%). (See Table A14 in appendix.)

1.2.11 People with Dementia

It is estimated that by 2050, the total number of Australians with dementia will increase to 2.8% of the population, a fourfold increase since 2000. A report "Dementia Estimates and Projections, NSW and its Regions" identifies that Northern Sydney/Central Coast (along with South Eastern Sydney/Illawarra) has, and will continue to have, the largest absolute number of people with dementia, see Table 4 below.

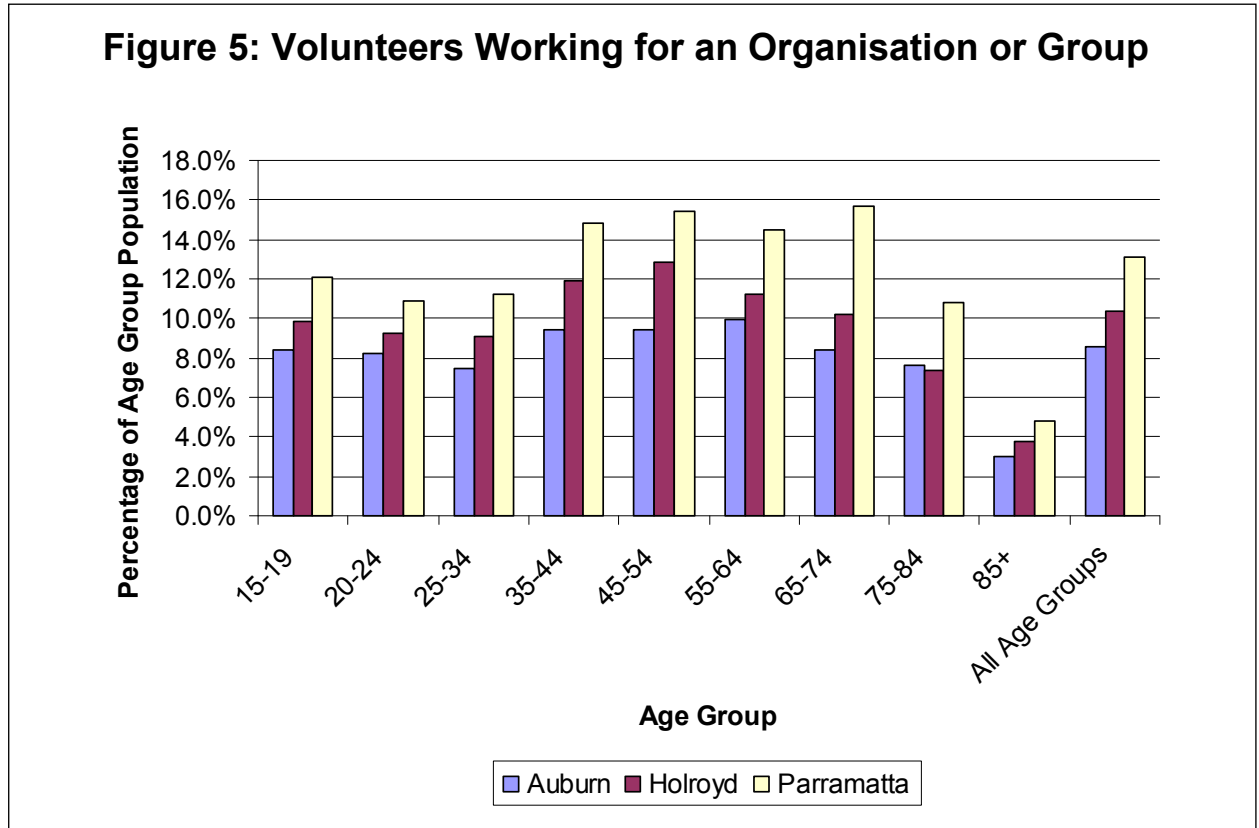

1.2.12 Volunteers

Around 21% of the total population 15 years and over, in the 3 LGAs, or 27,602 persons, do some volunteering work for an organisation or group (4,400; 8.6% Auburn, 7,441; 10.4% Holroyd and 15,761; 13.1% Parramatta). Just over half of the volunteers are female (See Table A15 in appendix.)

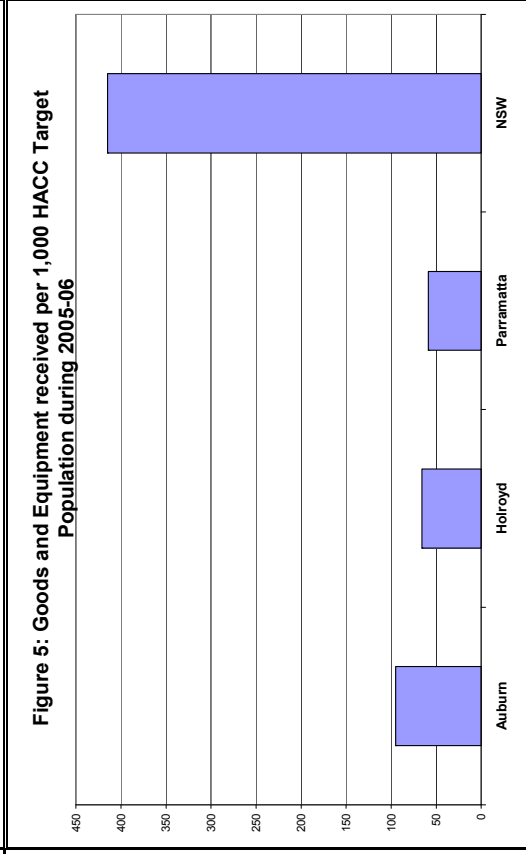
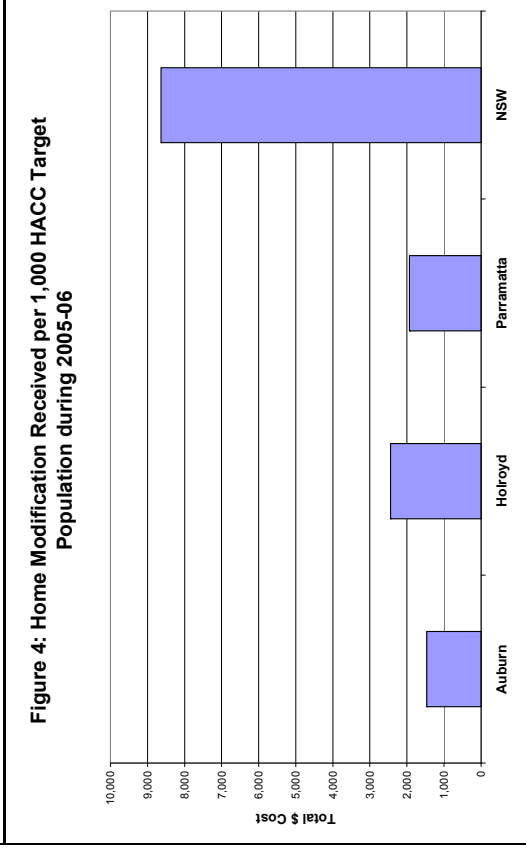
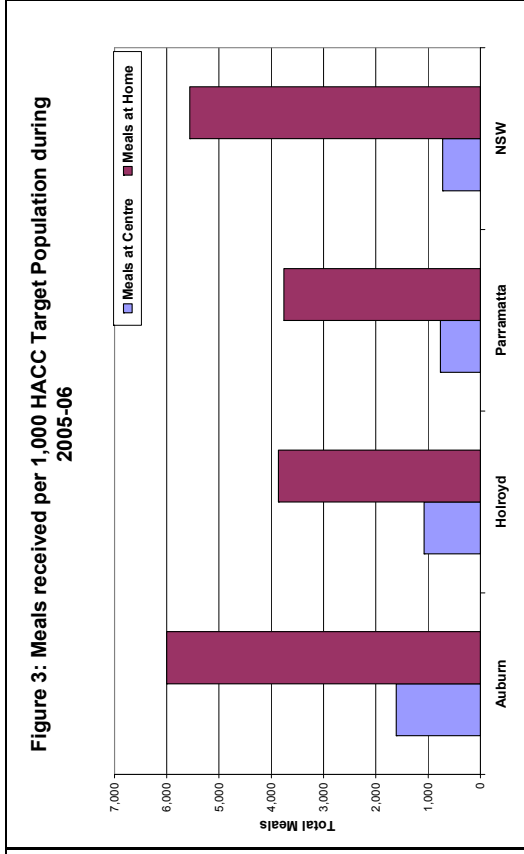
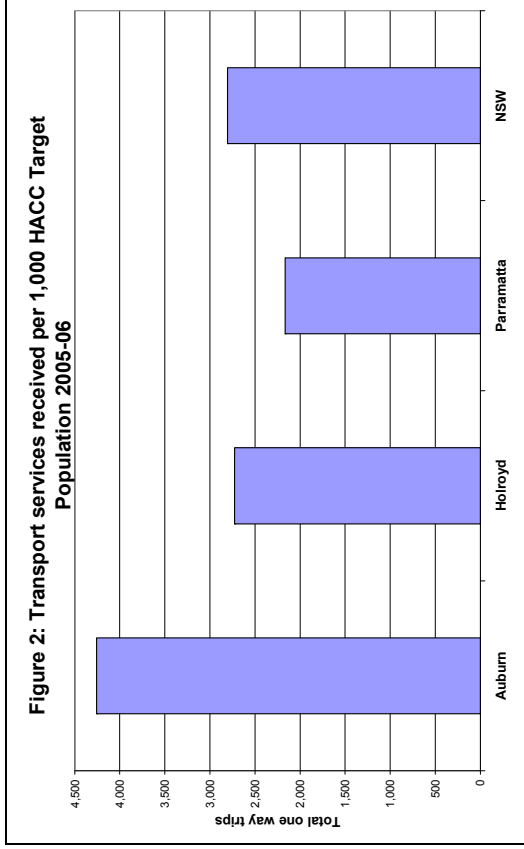
3. Service Outputs

It can be seen in Figure 1 below that the HACC Services received per 1,000 HACC target population in comparison to NSW include: a higher provision of Home Maintenance in Holroyd LGA, equal provision in Parramatta LGA, and lower provision in Auburn; a higher provision of Personal Care in Holroyd and Parramatta LGAs and lower provision in Auburn; and higher provision of Case Management in Auburn LGA and lower provision in Holroyd and Parramatta LGAs. There is a lower provision of Domestic Assistance, Nursing Care at Home and at Centre, Case Planning Review, Respite Care and Social Support in all 3 LGAs. Centre Based Day Care is much lower in Auburn and at Centre, Case Planning Review, Respite Care and Social Support in all 3 LGAs. Centre Based Day Care is much lower in Auburn but higher in Holroyd and Parramatta than NSW.

In comparison to the NSW HACC Services received per 1,000 HACC target population, it can be seen in Figure 2 below that the number of One Way Transport trips is lower in Holroyd and Parramatta but higher in Auburn, in Figure 3 below Meals Provided at Centres are equal or higher for all three LGAs, whilst Meals Provided at Home are much higher in Auburn, but lower in Holroyd and Parramatta. Home Modifications are much lower in all three LGAs relative to the State. (Figure 4 below). All LGAs have a lower amount of Goods and Equipment received (Figure 5 below).
