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Introduction

The Planning Framework is the collation of planning data for each specific LGA in a defined area and their Local Planning Area and is a working document.

The Planning Framework is developed through a collaborative process with the Department of Ageing Disability and Home Care, the Local Council Aged and Disability Workers and the community care sector.

The intent of this document is to:

- describe the currently available information and data on the area, including demographics, service system, specialist services within the generic system, DADHC funding and the roles played by various organisations within the framework; and
- track issues affecting the area, with a view to identifying service gaps and possible innovative service projects that may benefit the area.

An analysis of the information contained in the document may result in various responses, outcomes and expectations including:

- increase in funding;
- amalgamation of services;
- coordination of service types;
- review of service models; and
- additional mapping and more in depth information.

The document will be reviewed, on a regular basis with the Local Council Aged and Disability Worker and the community care sector, both through formal meetings and through informal processes.

Similar Frameworks are available for:

- Northern Sydney Local Planning Area; and
- Cumberland Prospect Local Planning Area.

1. Area Profile

1.1 Geography

Metro North Region is comprised of 3 Local Planning Areas, Cumberland Prospect, Nepean and Northern Sydney Local Planning Areas. The geographic areas covered in this Framework are the Blue Mountains, Hawkesbury and Penrith Local Government Areas (LGAs)

1.1.1 Blue Mountains Local Government Area

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Located in the Hawkesbury River Valley, Hawkesbury City Council is the largest Local Government Area in the Sydney Metropolitan region, NSW Australia, covering approximately 2,800 square kilometres.

Hawkesbury City extends from the Cumberland Plain in the south and east to the beautiful foothills and majestic escarpments of the Blue Mountains to the west and north.

Flanked by five rivers (Nepean, Hawkesbury, Grose, Macdonald and Colo) and featuring a number of historic towns, more than 70 percent of the Hawkesbury is National Park including World Heritage listed wilderness areas.

With an estimated population of over 66,000 and growing, Hawkesbury residents and visitors to the area enjoy the region's magnificent rural and bushland settings, its vibrant cultural life and thriving economy.

1.1.3 Penrith Local Government Area

Penrith is a city on the western fringe of the Sydney Metropolitan area, in east central NSW, Australia. Penrith is approximately 54 kilometres by road west of Sydney. The local government boundaries of the City of Penrith cover an area of some 407 square kilometres on the Nepean River flats of the Cumberland Plain. The Blue Mountains rise at the western border of the City area.

Penrith is one of the three largest Local Government Areas in Western Sydney and the sixth largest population of any local government area in NSW. The highway and M4 Freeway cross the area from east to west. There are two large areas to the north and south of the residential areas, mostly used for agricultural purposes. The Penrith Local Government Area has two Central Business Districts at Penrith and St Marys. (Source: www.penrithcity.nsw.gov.au)

1.2 Population

Population summary for Blue Mountains, Hawkesbury and Penrith LGAs follows.

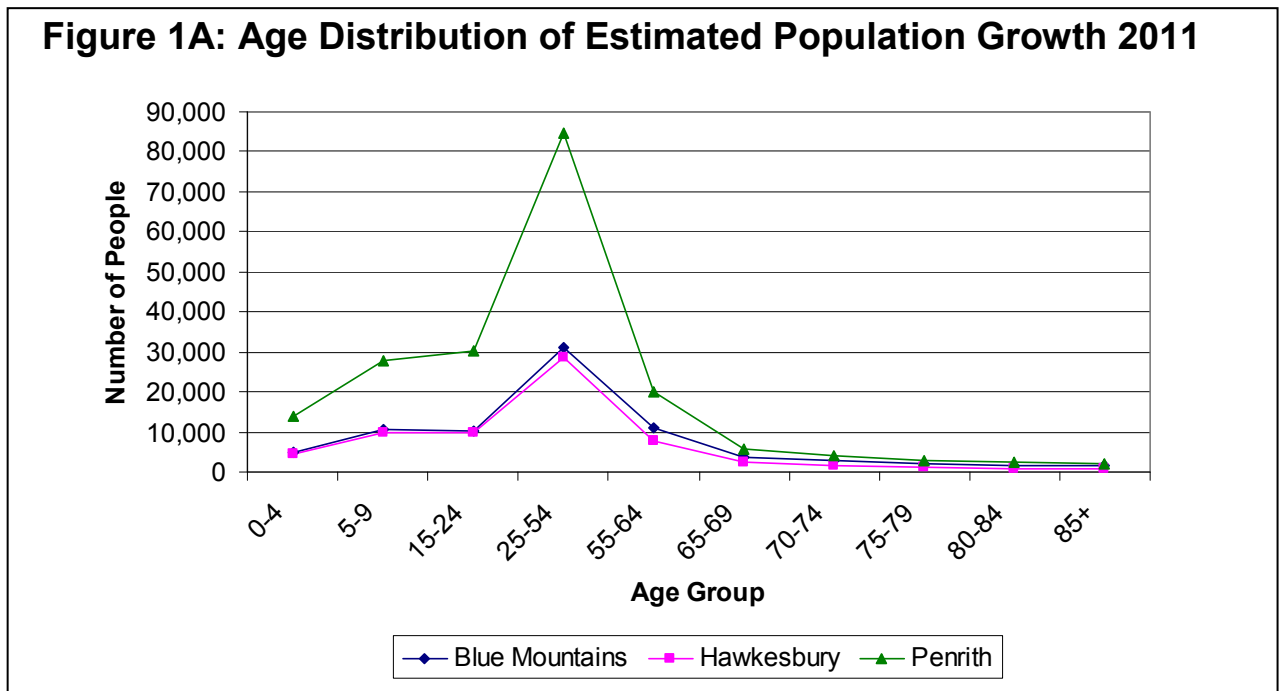
1.2.1 General Population

The population of Australia in August, 2006 was 19,855,288 and 6,549,177 (33%) of these lived in NSW. The population growth in the last 5 years was 5.8% nationally and 3.5% for NSW (Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) 2006 Census).

The population in the Blue Mountains was 74,069 according to the ABS 2006 Census. The population in the Blue Mountains has decreased slightly by 0.3% between 2001 and 2006 however it has increased by 1.9% from 1996 to 2006. The NSW Government has projected the Blue Mountains population to 79,220 in 2011 and 90,330 in 2031.

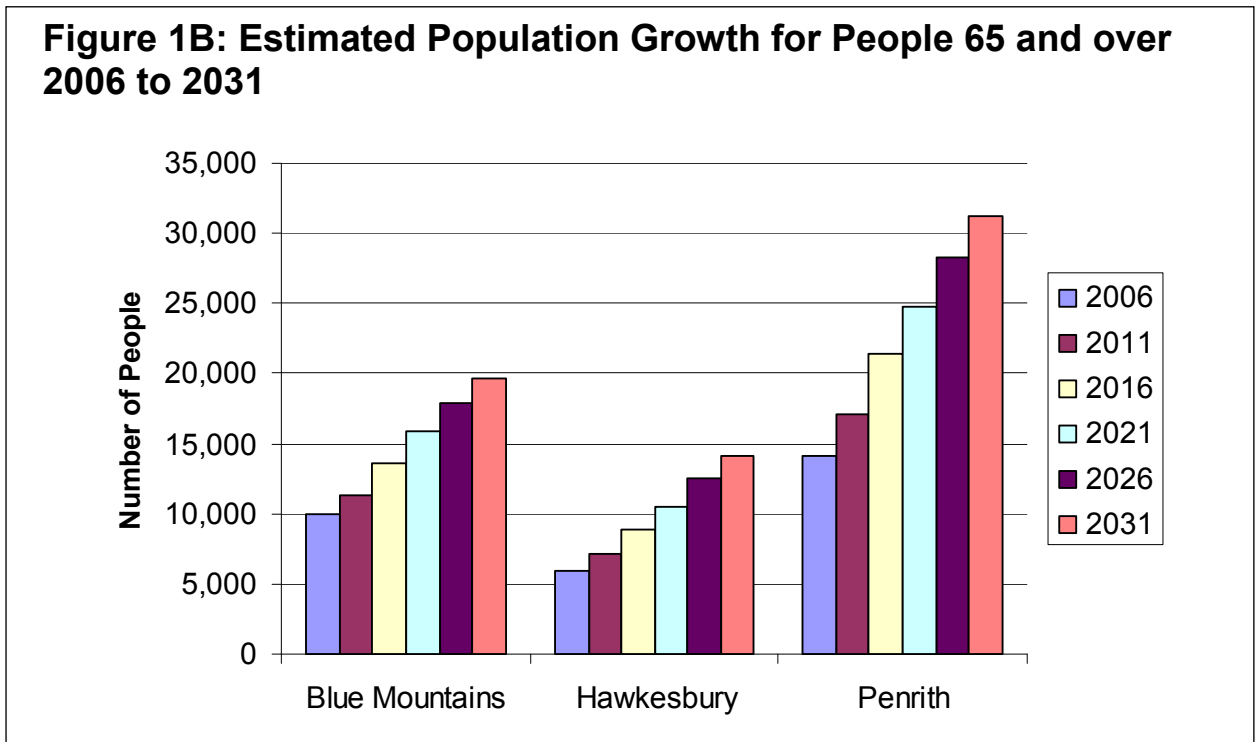
The population in the Hawkesbury was 60,561 according to the ABS 2006 Census. The population in Hawkesbury has decreased by 1.3% between 2001 and 2006 however it has increased by 5.5% from 1996 to 2006. The NSW Government has projected the Hawkesbury population to be 67,580 in 2011 and 83,920 in 2031.

The population in Penrith was 172,140 according to the ABS 2006 Census. The population in Penrith has decreased by 0.1% from 172,353 and increased by 5.5% from a population of 163,171 in 1996. The NSW Government has projected the population to be 194,020 in 2011 and 195,780 in 2031. (See Tables A2 and A3 in appendix)

1.2.2 Population Density

Population density in this Local Planning Area is highest for the Penrith LGA, with a population density of 438.3 persons per square kilometre, which is eight times higher than that of the Blue Mountains (53.8) and nineteen times higher than the Hawkesbury (22.6). (See Table 1 below and Table A1 in appendix.)

1.2.3 Age Distribution

There is an increasing ageing population with 18.7% of the total population in NSW aged 60 years and over, compared to 17.3% in 2001. This is also higher than the national average of 18.1% (ABS 2006 Census data).

Both nationally and in NSW the median age was 37 years in 2006, up from 35 years in 2001. The median ages of the population in Blue Mountains LGA was 39 years, in Hawkesbury 34 years, while in Penrith, the median age was 32 years. According to the 2006 Census data, the proportion of age groups is as follows (see table A5 in appendix):

Blue Mountains

- 20% under 15 years;
- 66% in the 15 – 64 year age group;
- 13% in the 65 years and over.

Hawkesbury

- 23.1% under 15 years;
- 67.2% in the 15 – 64 year age group;
- 9.7% in the 65 years and over.

Penrith

- 23% under 15 years;
- 69% in the 15 – 64 year age group;
- 8% in the 65 years and over.

1.2.4 Home and Community Care (HACC) Target Group

The estimated increase in the HACC target group from 2007/08 to 2010/11 for the Nepean LPA is 1370 people, with the estimated increase for the individual LGAs from 6486 to 6786 in Blue Mountains LGA; from 4788 to 5129 in Hawkesbury LGA and from 13285 to 12558 in Penrith LGA.

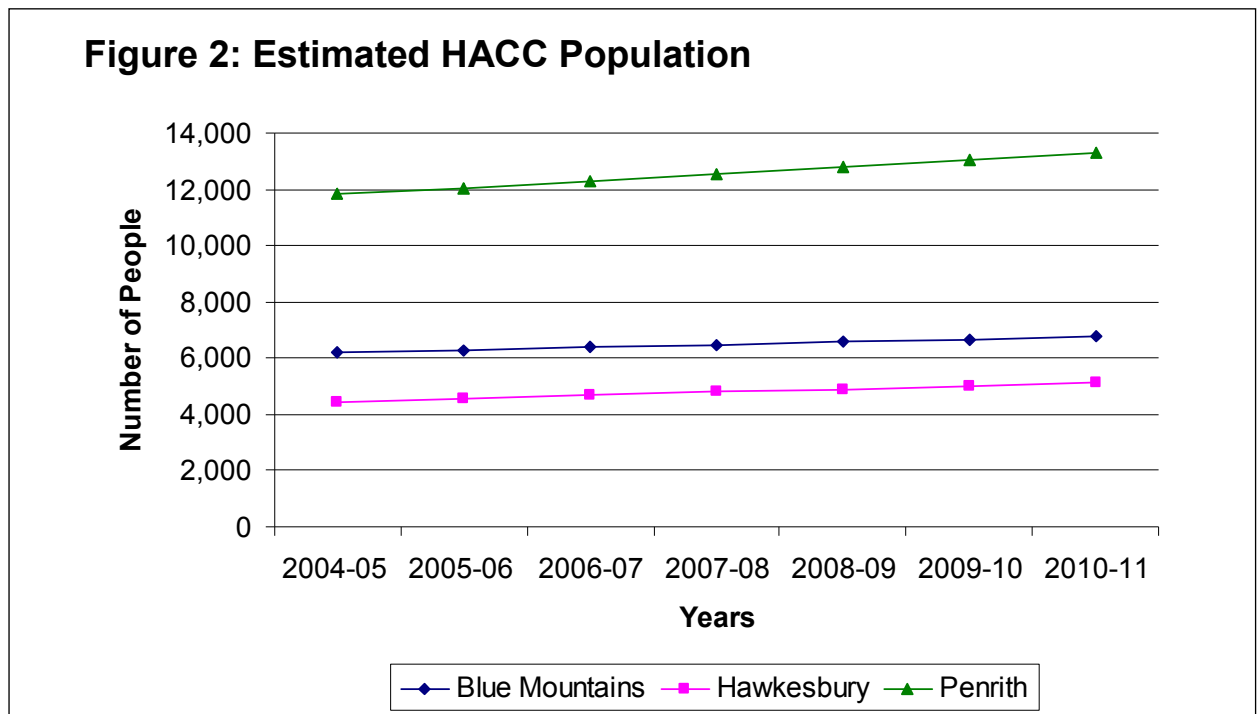
The proportion of people within a LGA receiving HACC services is positively related to the level of financial disadvantage. In other words, as the financial disadvantage of a LGA increases so too does the proportion of the population of the LGA receiving HACC services.

The IER for:

- NSW is 1031;
- Nepean Local Planning Area is 1047;
- Penrith is 1046;
- Blue Mountains is 1048;
- Hawkesbury is 1049.

(ABS Index of Economic Resources, 2001).

The IERs rating for LGAs in Nepean are in the middle of the scale. The mean percentage of LGA populations receiving HACC services for the 3 LGAs is in the mid percentage of 2.8% for 2005/06 period (HACC MDS data 2005/06).

1.2.5 People with Disabilities

The estimated total population of people with a disability in the 3 LGAs is 44,026 with 53.76% residing in the Penrith LGA, 26.58% in the Blue Mountains LGA and 19.66% in the Hawkesbury LGA. These percentages hold across all severity types. (See Table A6 in appendix.)

Blue Mountains:

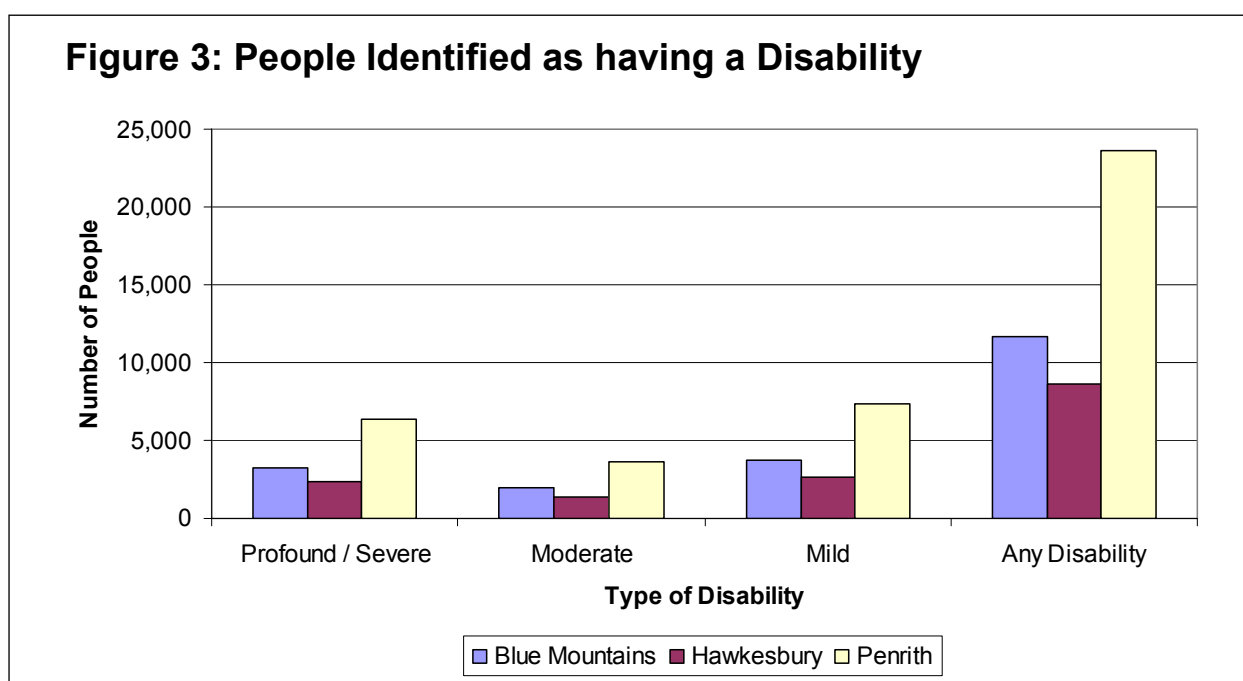
- 3,212 people with a profound to severe disability;
- 1,946 people with a moderate disability;
- 3,703 people with a mild disability;
- 11,702 people with any disability.

Hawkesbury:

- 2,325 people with a profound to severe disability;
- 1,353 people with a moderate disability;
- 2,675 people with a mild disability;
- 8,654 people with any disability.

Penrith:

- 6,392 people with a profound to severe disability;
- 3,625 people with a moderate disability;
- 7,319 people with a mild disability;
- 23,670 people with any disability.

The highest number of people with a profound or severe disability was in the 75 to 79 age group. The number and percentage of people in the 75 to 79 age group who had a profound or severe disability were:

- Blue Mountains 411, 21.54%;
- Hawkesbury 226 or 19.55%; and
- Penrith 554 or, 20.3%.

The percentage of population with a profound or severe core activity limitation (who reported needing assistance in at least one of the three core activities, ie self-care, mobility and communication) was less in the 3 LGAs than the 4.2% of NSW residents (4% Blue Mountains, 3.3% Hawkesbury and 3.5% Penrith). (See Table A7 in appendix.)

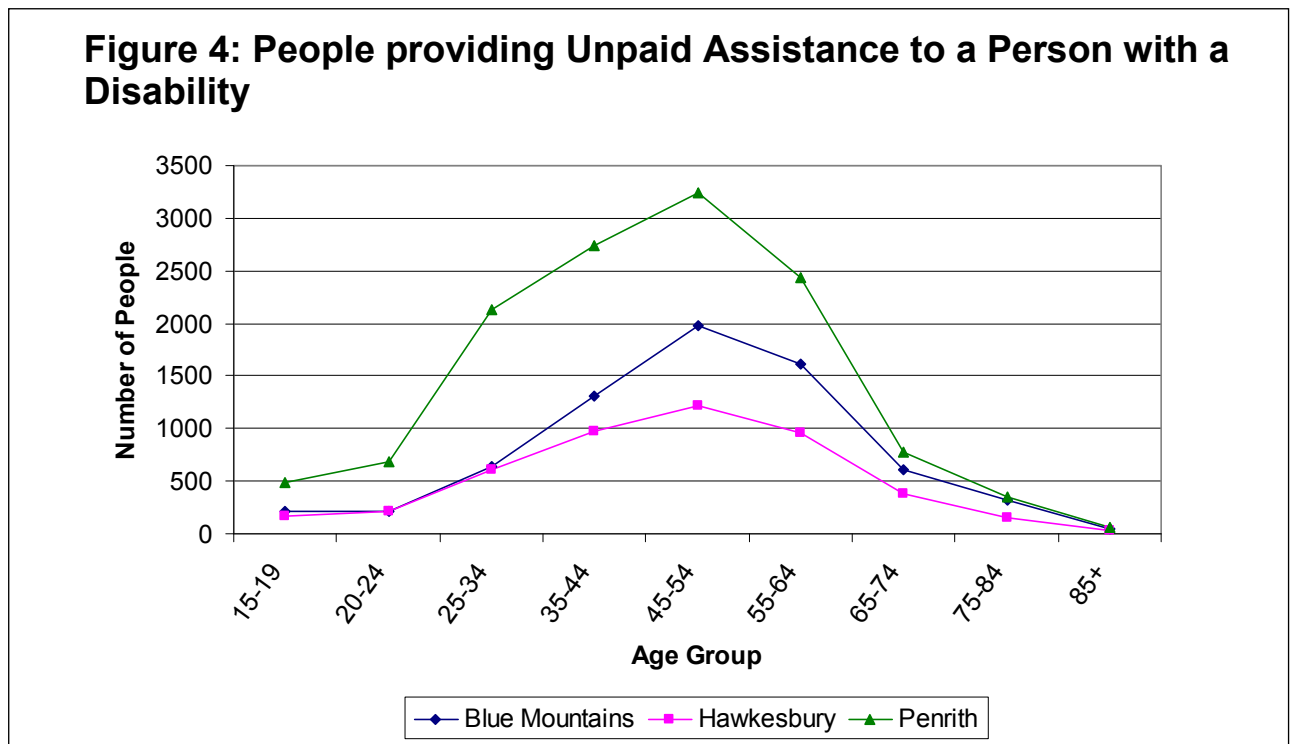
Indigenous people accounted for 2.1% of the population in NSW but made up 2.5% of the NSW population of people with a profound or severe disability, reflecting the higher disability prevalence rate (5%) amongst the Indigenous community. In contrast to the pattern of the general population, Indigenous males were more likely to have a profound or severe core activity limitation than females (ABS 2006 Census data).

1.2.6 Unpaid Carers

Of all persons aged 15 years and over in NSW, 10.4% provided unpaid assistance to those who needed help because of a disability, a long term illness or problems related to old age (in the two weeks before the Census night). This includes people who were in receipt of the Carer Allowance or Carer Payment (ABS 2006 Census data).

Locally, the number of unpaid carers according to the ABS 2006 Census data was 6,955 in the Blue Mountains; 4,703 in Hawkesbury LGA and 12,887 in the Penrith LGA, representing 11.8%; 10.1% and 9.7% of each LGA 15 years and over population respectively. The 55 to 64 years age group had the highest percentage of age group population as unpaid carers with 17.0% in the Blue Mountains LGA; 15.4% in Hawkesbury LGA and 14.4% in Penrith LGA. In NSW Indigenous people were more likely to provide care than the general population, 12.4% of Indigenous people are carers, compared to 10.4% for the general population. Similar to the general population, the majority of Indigenous carers were female and people aged 25-54 dominated the carer group (ABS 2006 Census data).

1.2.7 Type of Household

Nearly half of the households in the three LGAs were couple households, followed by: households with children under 15 years: and lone parent households in the Blue Mountains, and households with a non dependent child in Hawkesbury and Penrith (see Table 2A below).

1.2.8 Income Support

The number of people receiving Selected Income Support for the 3 LGAs as at June 2003 appears in Table 3 below. 1.2.9 Culturally and Linguistically Diverse (CALD) Populations

In 2006 approximately 18 percent of people living in the Nepean LPA were not born in Australia (Blue Mountains 16.5%, Hawkesbury 12.7%, and Penrith 20.5%). The most common countries of birth for people in Nepean born outside Australia were the United Kingdom and New Zealand.

In Blue Mountains LGA, the highest percentage of the general population born overseas came from the following countries:

- 0.8% Germany;
- 0.6% Netherlands;
- 0.3% India;
- 0.2% Poland;
- 0.2% Italy;
- 0.2% Philippines;
- 0.2% Malaysia;
- 0.2% China.

In Hawkesbury LGA, the highest percentage of the general population born overseas came from the following countries:

- 0.7% Malta;
- 0.5% Netherlands;
- 0.5% Germany;
- 0.4% Italy;
- 0.2% Philippines;
- 0.2% India;
- 0.2% China;
- 0.2% Malaysia;
- 0.2% Former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia (FYROM);
- 0.2% Greece.

In Penrith LGA, the highest percentage of the general population born overseas came from the following countries:

- 1.5% Philippines;
- 0.9% India;
- 0.8% Malta;
- 0.6% Italy;
- 0.6% Germany;
- 0.4% Netherlands;

- 0.4% Croatia;
- 0.4% Lebanon;
- 0.4% Sri Lanka.

In the 3 LGAs the proportion of people that speak a language other than English is:

- 4.8% Blue Mountains;
- 4.8% Hawkesbury;
- 13.4% Penrith.

According to the 2006 Census data, the main languages spoken at home vary between the three LGAs in Nepean. See Table 4 below for further information.

The percentage of the total population in each LGA that reported their Proficiency in Spoken English to be “Not Well” or “Not at All” in 2006 is at a similar percentage to what was reported in 2001. Most of the population in the 3 LGAs speak English proficiently. According to the ABS 2006 Census data:

in Blue Mountains

- 91.2% speaks English Only;
- 4.5% speak Other Language and speaks English Very Well or Well;
- 0.4% speak Other Language and speaks English Not Well or Not at All;
- 3.8% Language and proficiency in English Not Stated.

in Hawkesbury

- 90.1% speaks English Only;
- 4.4% speak Other Language and speaks English Very Well or Well;
- 0.5% speak Other Language and speaks English Not Well or Not at All;
- 5.0% Language and proficiency in English Not Stated.

in Penrith

- 81.9% speaks English Only;
- 12.0% speak Other Language and speaks English Very Well or Well;
- 1.6% speak Other Language and speaks English Not Well or Not at All;
- 4.6% Language and proficiency in English Not Stated.

For the 65 and over age group, the percentage that Speaks Other Language and speaks English Not Well or Not at All increases to:

- Blue Mountains - 0.7% of the 65 years and over age group;
- Hawkesbury - 1.6% of the 65 years and over age group;
- Penrith – 5.9% of the 65 years and over age group.

1.2.10 Aboriginal Population

The Aboriginal population for the Local Planning Area is 6,155, which is 2% of the Nepean population. The highest number of Aboriginal are living in the Penrith area (4048), followed by Hawkesbury (1,163) and lastly the Blue Mountains (944). The highest Aboriginal age group for Penrith LGA was 5 to 9 year olds (13.3%), while in the Blue Mountains and Hawkesbury the 10-14 age group had the highest percentage of the total Aboriginal population with 14.1% and 15.1% respectively. The age group 65 and over represented one of the smallest age groups of the Aboriginal population (Blue Mountains -3.5%, Hawkesbury – 2.6% and Penrith – 2%). (See Table A14 in appendix.)

1.2.11 People with Dementia

It is estimated that by 2050, the total number of Australians with dementia will increase to 2.8% of the population, a fourfold increase since 2000. The report "Dementia Estimates and Projections NSW and its Regions" developed by Access Economics Pty Ltd for Alzheimer's Australia, indicates that as a proportion of NSW's population, the number of people with dementia is projected to increase from 1.0% in 2002 to 2.7% in 2050. There is however considerable variation between regions. Western and South Western Sydney currently have the lowest rates of dementia prevalence (as a proportion of the area's population), but are projected to witness the largest increases in dementia prevalence between 2002 and 2050. Western Sydney will experience a fourfold increase from 7,000 to 28,000 people over the forecast period, see Table 5 below.

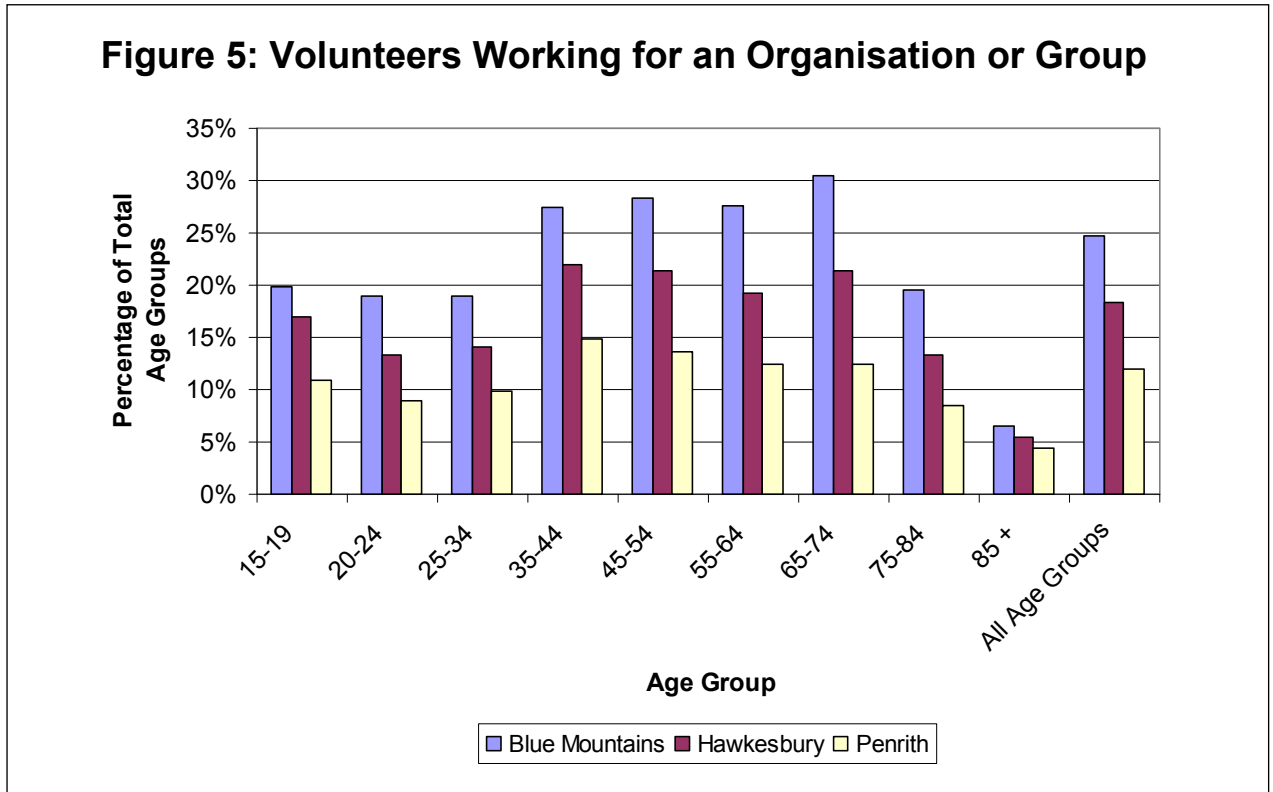

1.2.12 Volunteers

According to 2006 Census data 16.3% or 38,840 people in the Nepean LPA aged over 15 do some volunteer work for an organisation or group (14,535, 24.70% Blue Mountains; 8,506, 18.3% Hawkesbury; and 15,799, 11.9% Penrith). Just over half of the volunteers are female (56.9% Blue Mountains; 57.4% Hawkesbury; and 58.6% Penrith). Please see Table A15 in the appendix for further information about volunteering.

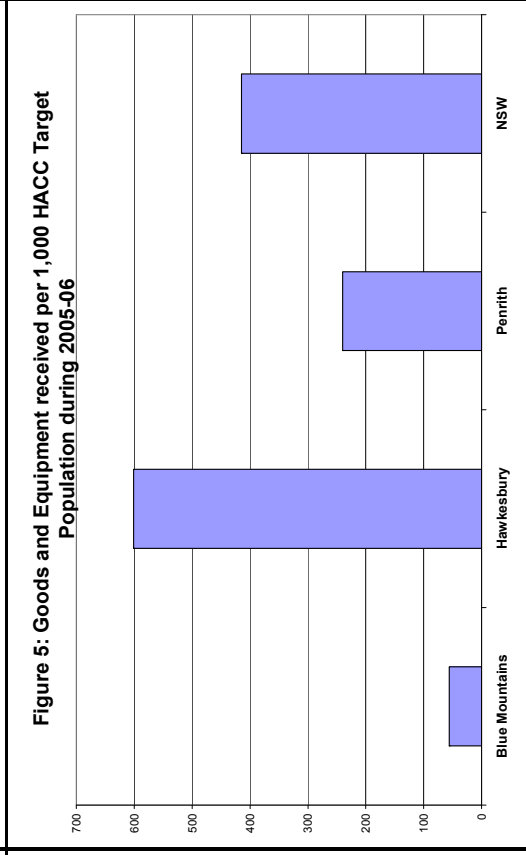
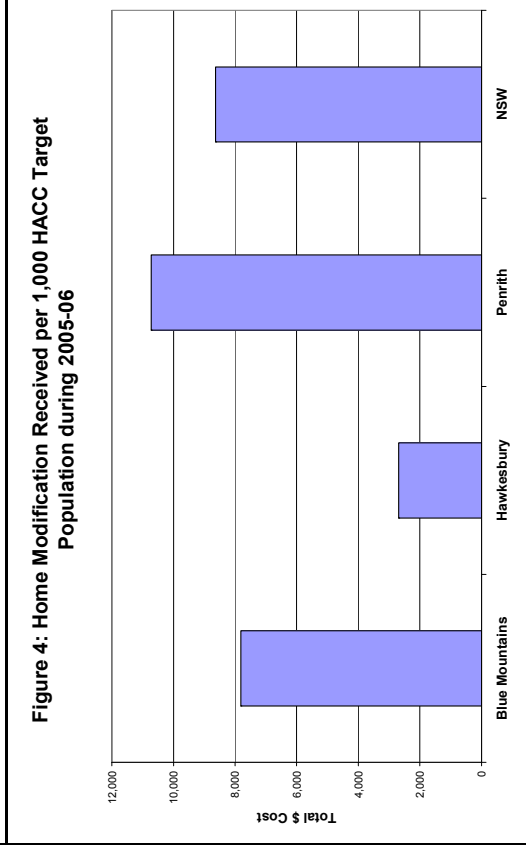
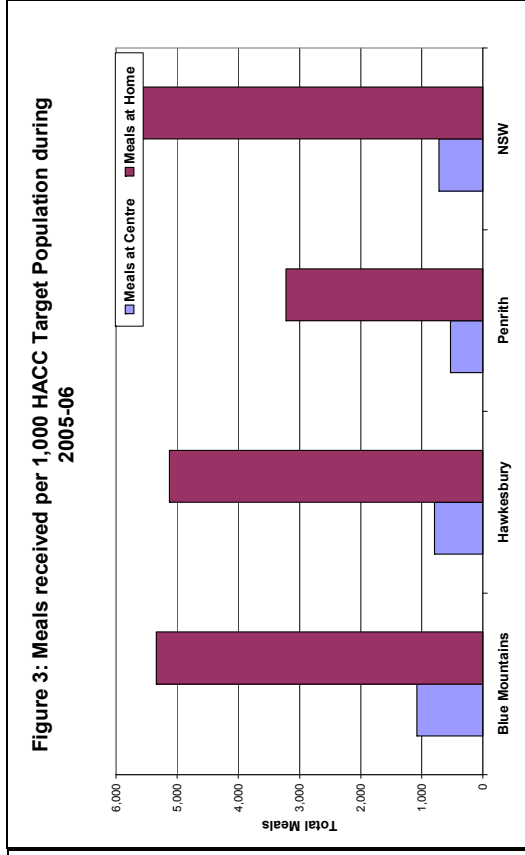
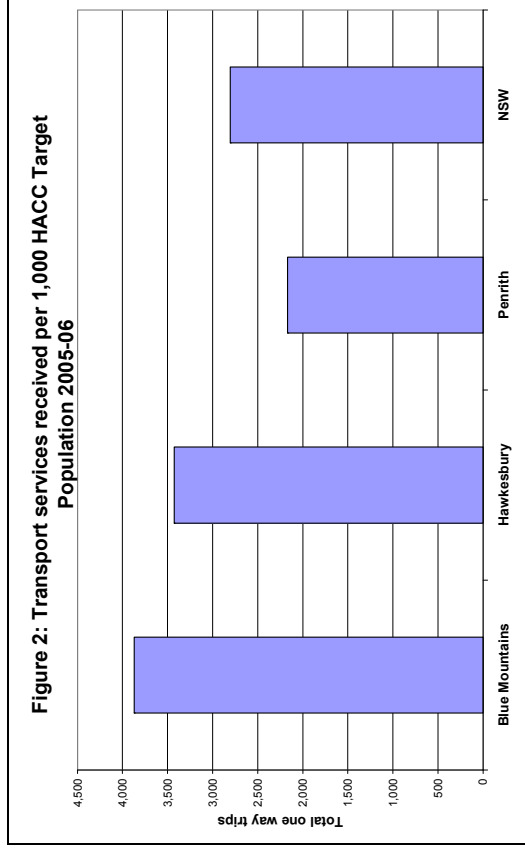
3. Service Outputs

It can be seen in Figure 1 below that the HACC services received per 1,000 HACC target population in the 3 LGAs in comparison to NSW include a higher provision of Centre Based Day Care in the Hawkesbury and Domestic Assistance in the Blue Mountains, Personal Care in Penrith, Respite Care in the Hawkesbury and Social Support in the Blue Mountains.

In comparison to the NSW HACC services received per 1,000 HACC target population, it can be seen in Figure 2 below that the number of one way trips is higher in the Blue Mountains and Hawkesbury whilst lower in Penrith. In Figure 3 the number of Meals received at a Centre is on par with NSW whilst the number of Meals received at Home is lower in the Penrith LGA. In Figure 4 the grants spent on Home Modifications is lower in the Hawkesbury, whilst in Figure 5 both the Blue Mountains and Penrith have a lower amount of goods and equipment received.
